Introduction

Most schools with primary-age pupils receive the PE and sport premium funding. Schools receive the funding based on the number of pupils they have in years 1 to 6. Schools with 16 or fewer eligible pupils receive £1000 per pupil. Schools with 17 or more eligible pupils receive £16,000 and an additional payment of £10 per pupil.

Woodfield Academy

Although Woodfield receives funding for Key Stage 2 children, the Academy has made a very significant commitment to the current and future provision of sport and physical activity in the school and community to the tune of approximately £60,000 towards the provision of our new 3G Artificial Turf Pitch.

Aims of the Sport Premium Funding

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer.

This means that schools should use the premium to:

- develop or add to the PE and sport activities that the school already offers
- make improvements now that will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

For example, funding can be used to:

- hire qualified sports coaches to work with teachers
- provide existing staff with training or resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively
- introduce new sports or activities and encourage more pupils to take up sport
- support and involve the least active children by running or extending school sports clubs, holiday clubs and [Change4Life](#) clubs
- run sport competitions
- increase pupils' participation in the [School Games](#)
- run sports activities with other schools

By providing a structured programme, JASS aims to support young people through the transition from primary school to lower secondary school. JASS has been designed to be flexible and adaptable to the interests and abilities of individuals to ensure it is achievable by all participants, whilst matching the goals of their Schools Curriculum.
